Three events that made the biggest impact on who you are today: **1) Doing One-Act performances 2)**

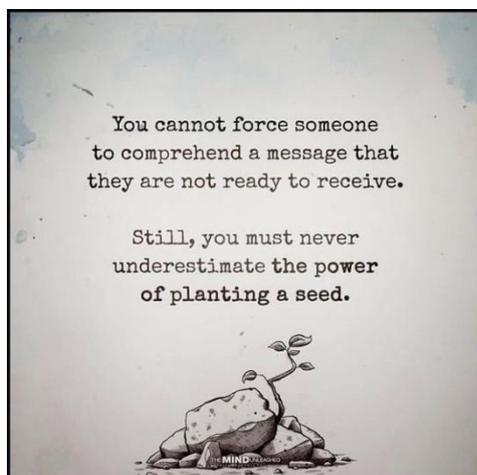
**Going to retreats 3) Countless hours playing basketball**

## A Modern Day Saint

Servant of God\* Fr. Emil Joseph Kapaun was a Roman Catholic priest and United States Army captain who served as a United States Army chaplain during World War II and the Korean War.

Born: **April 20, 1916, Pilsen, Kansas,**

Died: **May 23, 1951, Pyoktong County, North Korea**

Buried: **Mass grave**

Parents: **Enos and Elizabeth Kapaun**

Awards: **Medal of Honor, Purple Heart, Bronze Medal**

Education: **Catholic University of America; Kenrick-Glennon Seminary, St. Louis MO;**

**Conception Seminary, Conception MO**

**Parents, did it ever occur to you that one of the reasons God has called your son to be a priest is so that your own faith will be strengthened??**

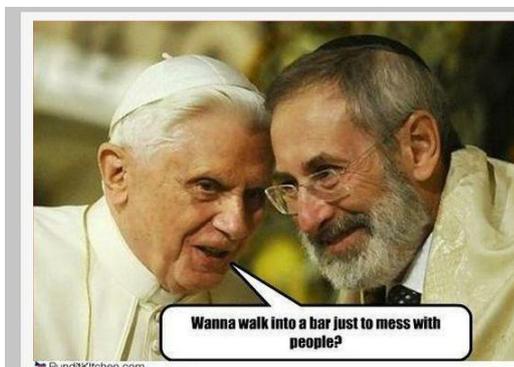


\*At least five years after a person's death (unless a special exception is made by the pope), a formal request is made to consider him or her for sainthood. The people making the request are usually from the candidate's church or religious community. They submit their request to the bishop of the diocese where the person died. The request tells how the person lived a life of holiness and lists reasons for considering the candidate for sainthood. If the bishop believes there is enough evidence to consider the person for sainthood, he asks the Vatican for permission to open a special tribunal. Witnesses are then called to attest to the candidate's goodness, holiness, devotion to God, and other virtues. If the person passes this step, he or she is named a "Servant of God."

Priesthood is a sacrament that endures forever. It does not end at death. It makes a permanent mark on the soul that can never be erased, repeated, conferred temporarily or ended. A priest still has the mark of a priest on his soul when he is in heaven!

When you get to heaven, you will see some men there with this mark on their souls and you will immediately know that they were priests on earth.

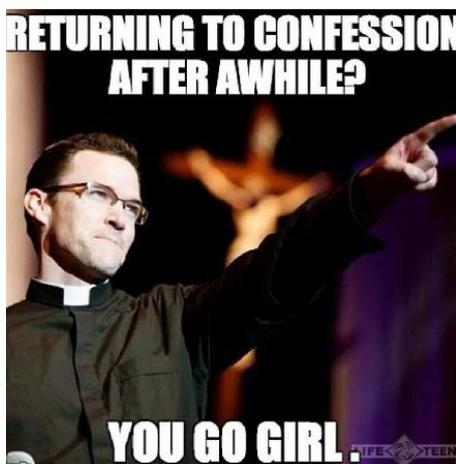
