During the Easter Season we read from John's Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. There is so much there that can speak to us as a Church, how we are to live out being disciples of Jesus, after his Resurrection. I want to share some thoughts from a recent set of readings, Thursday of the Third Week of Easter.

The Gospel (John 6:44-51) comes from Jesus' explanation of the Eucharist. God gives us the gift of Jesus' Body and Blood at Mass as our food. "I am the living bread ... whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my Flesh for the life of the world." Jesus desires that everyone come to know him, so that he can give us his life. Jesus also says that "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draw him." When we come to Mass, it is not just our own idea, God the Father has drawn us to himself, to give us his life.

God wants to draw all people to himself, but how does he do that? How does the Father draw someone not yet connected to him? It doesn't happen automatically, as Jesus says, "no one has seen the Father except the one who is from God." How then can people not yet connected to God see the Father, hear Him drawing them to himself? First, that is why Jesus came: Jesus Christ is the "one who is from God" who is with us to lead us to the Father. Second, the Father uses his other "Christs" his Christians. We are given the mission to help the Father draw people to himself.

The first reading from Acts 8:26-40 gives us a model for how this happens. The passage begins, "The angel of the Lord spoke to Philip, 'Get up and head south on the road ...'" Philip is prompted by God to travel, perhaps a way he wasn't used to going. God will give us similar interior promptings to do certain things, place us in certain situations so that we might do his work. In this case, Philip meets the chariot of an Ethiopian royal court official, and "the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go and join up with that chariot.'" Likely Philip would not have interacted with such a person of high office, but prompted by God, he goes. God will do that for us too, prompt us to "go," to actively reach out. As a Church, as a parish, as individual Catholics, we cannot simply wait for people to come to us, but must go and befriend those that God desires to draw to himself.

Unknown to Philip, the Ethiopian was reading from the prophet Isaiah to pass the time as he rode. Philip engages him in conversation and is invited to join him. As they travel, Philip "beginning with this Scripture passage, proclaimed Jesus to him." It must have been a long and fruitful discussion, for when they see some water, the Ethiopian asks to be baptized. This is a wonderful example of how God desires to use us as well. For example, there maybe an individual, perhaps already in your normal interactions already, whom the Spirit is prompting you to walk with. They may not yet be seeking or even curious about the faith like the Ethiopian, you may not be called to walk with them as far as that official was, but they may need you to first form a friendship of trust. Listening to the Holy Spirit will help us to know when further conversations relating to the faith are naturally appropriate. Perhaps I may be there to plant the seed, someone else will be sent to water it, but God will be the one to cause the growth (cf. 1 Corinthians 3:6). That is how it was for Philip: once the Ethiopian was baptized, Philip was called elsewhere. We are not told the rest of the Ethiopian's story, but it is likely that God then sent others into his life, connected him with the Christian community, so that he could continue to grow in his new faith.

The faith of the early Church spread quickly through these kind of personal encounters. Today the Father continue to draw all people to himself through their personal encounters with us, desiring them to share in his life in the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist. Will we answer his call to be his voice, his hands, his feet, his missionary disciples?

## Family Formation April 11, 2018

- Mass intention was for the souls of Jerry and Doris Rotert. Mass collection was \$34.00.
  - Food Pantry items collected was 13 lbs. 4 oz.
  - Classroom Lesson and Adult Topic was *"Kneeling Before The Majesty Of God (Eucharistic Adoration)"*. Eucharistic Adoration is where we come to worship, adore, honor, and give glory to God. The keeping of the Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass was a part of Christian practice from the beginning. Father explained the Monstrance and our Saints Reliquary. We venerate Saints we don't worship them. Worship is for God only. During Eucharistic Adoration we have an Exposition (beginning) and a Benediction (ending). This is held on the Thursday before First Friday each month, for 24 hours. Father Vogel showed us inside the back cover of our missals to find songs and prayers to participate in Exposition after morning Mass on Thursday, and right before First Friday Mass. Father talked about steps we can use when praying at Adoration. 1. Recognize the Presence of God. 2. Thanksgiving. 3. Petition. 4. Atonement. **Question:** Can Catholics believe in reincarnation?  
**Answer:** No. Christian faith is in the "resurrection of the body," as we say in the Creed. Reincarnation is the belief that after death, someone's soul can be reborn into a new body (whether human or animal) to live a new life here on earth. This is very different from and incompatible with the resurrection of the body. From the moment of our conception, God created our unique spiritual soul specifically for our unique physical body. The combination of our body and soul is what makes us who we are. That is why death, which is the separation of the soul and body, is so painful: body and soul are meant to be together. It is wrong to think of our body as simply a "shell" or "vessel" for our soul, as if our soul is really us, but our body is not. I am both my soul and body, which is why our funeral rites have such deep respect for the body of the deceased, and we have specific places (cemeteries) set aside to ensure the bodies are respected and the people are never forgotten. At the end of time, when the resurrection of our bodies will occur, all who have died will receive their bodies again; body and soul will be united again as God designed us. In the resurrection we will receive our same body back, though our body will be perfected, something like the way Jesus' body was perfected after his Resurrection. Jesus' body was the same body (it even had his wounds), but was glorified (he could enter into a locked room). Reincarnation is very different, for it claims someone would get an entirely different body, denying the unique life of the individual person. Reincarnation often fails to make the distinction between human and non-human beings, which can lead to the denial of human dignity. It also can mislead someone into a false sense of security, thinking that no matter how bad they are, they will get another shot. Rather, Scripture says that we die once, and then is the judgment (Hebrews 9:27). Jesus says: "Do not be amazed at this, because the hour is coming in which all who are in the tombs will hear his voice and will come out, those who have done good deeds to the resurrection of life, but those who have done wicked deeds to the resurrection of condemnation" (John 5:28-29).

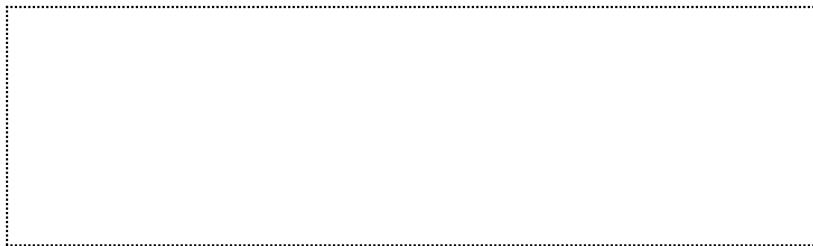

## St. Boniface School Advisory Board April 20, 2018

### □ Old Business:

\*\*The Parish Finance Committee does not meet until April 26<sup>th</sup>; therefore the finance reports will be reviewed at the May meeting.

\*\*Alexa Johnson was hired as a full time teacher for the next school year and St. Boniface will be paying 3/8 of Lauren Borer's salary. These two items increased the budget substantially. Tuition will not be raised for the 2018/2019 school year. This year we will be using past interest from the endowment to make up the difference for a balanced budget.

### □ New Business:

\*\*Next school year we will be offering two preschool classes, morning and afternoon. We plan to have around 17 preschool students and will keep the classes as even as possible. Seven families have already requested the morning class.

\*\*New student visitation day was successful. Three families came for visitation and another family came to speak with Betty after visitation day. Transportation is the biggest issue for families wanting to bring their children to the school; the school is in need of another bus driver.

\*\*The by-laws were reviewed and a few changes were made. By laws state that at the spring parent meeting the new board members will be voted on. "At the spring parent meeting" was eliminated since we now vote via electronic ballot.

\*\*The St. Boniface School building and grounds committee will be eliminated because Pope John takes care of the grounds.

\*\*We may try to start a "Parent Mentor" program at the beginning of the school year which would match a current family to a new family. The "Parent Mentor" would be there to help the new families get familiar with the way the school is run. A motion passed to approve these changes.

### □ Administrator's Report:

\*\*The preschool program is tentatively scheduled for May 16<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 a.m. The preschool students would receive a promotional certificate and this will be the last day for them.

\*\*The last day of classes is May 18<sup>th</sup>. The Spring Concert for St. Boniface is scheduled for May 7<sup>th</sup>.

\*\*There is a committee of four teachers working on a homework guideline policy. At the faculty meeting teachers gave input/changes to the policy. Betty Getzfred is hoping by early next week to distribute the revised policy to the board and then will be looking for possible approval by both boards at the May meeting.

## **Pope John XXIII/St. Boniface Combined School Advisory Board April 19, 2018**

□ Dr. Michael Ashton, Superintendent of Catholic Schools spoke to the board on "Vision of Catholic Schools"

\* Proclaim the message of faith \* to foster community \* to encourage worship and prayer \* to motivate people to serve others \* to build a personal relationship with Jesus Christ . The Archdiocese of Omaha mission is "One Church, Encountering Jesus, Equipping Disciples and Living Mercy". Our job is to engage families in their church and school. How do we get there? What will the process look like?

□ Father John Norman shared thoughts on the school's planning process. What will the next steps be; Family relationship with the school and church. How will our school system look in the future? A committee needs to be formed and a plan in place by January, 2019.

□ Administrator's Report By Betty Getzfred:

\*\*Implementation of the NGSS science standards. The 3-12 grade science teachers have attended workshops and have met with ESU 8 staff, Heidi Rethmeier. There will be a different format for Science for grades 6-8 and 3-5.

\*\*A STREAM-CI Excellence grant was submitted to the Archdiocese. The grant asked for monetary assistance to help create a maker-space in our library to be used PK through -12 cross curriculum.

\*\*A teacher's committee have been working to revise the homework/ assignment guideline policy. Betty Getzfred will send the policy to the board next week. She requested board member to add their input and to discuss it with parents. She asked the board to share their opinions. The policy will be reviewed at the May meeting.

\*\*Archbishop's Educational Dinner will be held Thursday, September 20th, 2018.

□ President's Report: Father Vogel explained the approach St. Boniface, St. Bonaventure and St. John's of Petersburg cluster. Members of the three parishes had sessions with representatives from Archdiocese's Evangelization ministry to exam the internal, cultural structure of our parishes and cluster. Two follow up sessions were held earlier this week; how do we begin? Held a dream session. The question - is there a clear path?

□ Old Business:

\*\*Lighting bids - The lighting committee met with Hunter Frisch of Frisch Electric. Mr. Frisch's advice was to go with LED panels. He stated the cost of the panel have gone down in price. It was decided to do one room and then make the decision. On April 13th the PK room lighting was changed. The school has received an Excellence Grant for \$17,000. To install LED panels would be an additional \$8,000. There is money still available from the Excellence Grant and it was suggested to request funding from the Kavelage Trust Fund. A motion passed to use the LED panels throughout the building.

\*\*Safety and security training was discussed. A committee consisting of staff, board members, firefighters, EMT'S, and police personnel will meet to review the present procedures and to make the changes needed for the safety of students and staff.

\*\*Betty Getzfred handed out the amended approved guidelines for memorials given to the school.

\*\*A wellness committee will be formed. The committee will meet with Deb Baum prior to the August board meeting.

□ New Business:

Summer projects:

\*\*Lighting.

\*\*Carpet (library and Room 2) and replacing the sidewalk on the north side of school.

□ Committee Progress Report- Grass seed has been planted where the trees were removed on the north side of school.
